
This is Rioja

In the north of Spain, on both banks of the Ebro river, flanked by the majestic Sierra de Cantabria and Sierra de la Demanda mountain ranges, lies the thousand-year-old wine-growing region of Rioja. Hundreds of years have passed since the farming of the first grapevines in Rioja.

An origin that goes back to the Ancient Rome, when a whole culture around wine that defines, molds and marks a territory emerged, and it's alive through centuries up to present days.



Rioja is one of the Designations of Origin in the world that offers consumers the most stringent controls on quality and authenticity. To this end, together with one of the most rigorous control regulations, Rioja has made it compulsory for winery facilities to be dedicated exclusively to producing Rioja grapes and wine and for wine to always be bottled at source.

Three areas, 100 kilometers of diversity and a thousand wines make Rioja one of the most prestigious wine regions in the world.

The Triumphant Tempranillo

Indigenous to Spain, the versatile Tempranillo grape finds its finest expression in Rioja, best defined by elegance and quality, from young to aged and classic to modern wines.

Beyond its mastery of aged reds, Rioja offers a diverse array of wines, including roses, whites, and sparkling varieties, each boasting unparalleled quality and character. Highest Honors

In 1991, Rioja became the first wine region in Spain to receive the highest designation of Denominación de Origen Calificada for producing Spain's finest wine, as well as the first to receive D.O. status designation in 1925.

Released When Ready to Drink

Rioja is the only wine region in the world that releases wines when they are ready to drink, after aging in barrel and bottle.



Rioja Classifications & Seals of Authenticity

Each bottle of wine that comes from the region of Rioja is clearly marked with a D.O.Ca. trust seal. Each seal ensures adherence to the strict wine and aging qualifications – as well as the quality standards required by the D.O.Ca. – from grape growing through to bottling.

Aged 1+ years in barrel

Flagship wine with soft tannins and luscious flavors. Great for richer meals and special evenings!

- Aged 3+ years with at least 1 year in barrel and 6 months in bottle
- 2+ years with at least 6 months in barrel

Gran Reserva

Exquisite wines from exceptional vintages. Often aged much longer, perfect for elegant dinners and holidays!

Aged 5+ years with at least 2 years in barrel and 2 years in bottle

4+ years with at least 6 months in barrel

Another identifier on the labels is the zonal classifications, which highlight the terroir and origins of the wine.
